After completing his phone calls, Bob would go over to the high school to help the loader and greet the volunteers. Always upbeat and cheerful, Bob was a highly valued member of the MOWWP team.

Prior to his retirement in 1998, Bob taught in the Education Department at the University of Bridgeport. He served in the US Merchant Marine in the Pacific during World War II. In addition to his service to MOWWP, Bob volunteered with the Ecumenical Emergency Food Pantry. He is survived by his wife of 60 years, Margaret (Midge) Graveley.

He gave Anne a drawing in just a few days. She loved it, and when Gregg later wanted to modify the design, she wouldn't hear of it.

We've become very attached to Gregg's design, and you have seen it on every piece of our mail. We were especially saddened to learn of his untimely death last November at the age of 43. Born with a heart defect which required numerous surgeries and limited his activities, Gregg nonetheless lived life to the fullest and was an inspiration to all who knew him.

From White Plains High School he went on to Syracuse University, where he earned a BFA in Advertising Design. Starting with costume design, Gregg worked in many media, including paint, collage, metal and wood sculpture, and mixed media, as well as live performance art, and often spontaneous group creations.



### What Will My Donation Buy?

We're often asked, "What will my gift buy?" And that's a reasonable question. We regularly point out that our fund raising allows us to deliver meals to clients who are unable to pay the full fee (\$9 per day for two meals) or to pay anything at all.

So if you'd like that sort of a very specific guide to how far your gift will go, here are a few ideas. Each covers a delivery of a full hot noon meal and a sandwich supper each day.

- \$18 will feed a couple for one day.

- \$45 will feed one client two meals a day for a week.

- \$100 will cover the subsidy for four weeks for a client who pays \$4 per day.
